MONTHLY LUNCHEON AUG. 27th

Beachmere - Caren Vigneault of White Pine programs will discuss the many nature connected learning programs this fine non-profit educational organization offers all year long for both young and old. White Pine's headquarters are on Cape Neddick, Maine's Mountain Road. This year, summer camps included many nature-based projects for various age groups: playful learning with songs and pretend experiences; primitive skills such as shelter building; using one's senses to absorb the world of nature; impromptu performance expression; the wilderness adventure as a link to independence; exploration and proper use of the land including safe fire construction; hands-on learning about vernal pools; wildlife tracking and sign evaluation; understanding bird language; teen age canoeing expedition including sleeping lakeside.

The speaker will touch upon these and other programs designed to renew connections to the earth and deepen our awareness of place.

September 24 - Coastal House - our guest

speaker will be Jim Nowak, Executive Director and Co-Founder of the dZi Foundation. This extraordinary Colorado-based organization currently focuses on a program called RAV which means "Revitalize a Village." Through RAV, dZi works with the most remote and under-served communities, such as a current one in eastern Nepal. These villages, populated primarily with low castes, are multiple day treks from the nearest road; as a result, they have been overlooked by other aid organizations as well as by government. For a period of 4-6 years, dZi works directly with members of these seriously overlooked neglected communities, aiding them in building sustainable programs created to improve the quality of life of individual members through building local infrastructure, generating income.

TODAY'S LUNCHEON PROGRAM

The theme for today's program is the connectivity of all living things in particular in relation to the environment and the resources it provides. In her presentation, Karen McElmurry, former director of Cape Neddick's Center for Wildlife for twenty-one years, will direct our attention to the importance of looking at the whole picture, that is, the plant-animal-human relationships therein, emphasizing the impact humans have on the environment.

Included will be information concerning how we can protect our own ecosystems.

Karen will discuss the work and mission of the Center for Wildlife, including some of the species

it treats and why they were brought to and treated at the Center. She will elaborate on the reasons it's important to evaluate their condition and to report on the Center's findings. Often, wildlife species are indicators of the environment's health. Wildlife rehabilitation centers such as Cape Neddick's are on the frontline of seeing species that are affected by an unhealthy ecosystem.

Joining Karen will be Susan Hansen, current Executive Director of the Center for Wildlife. Both Susan and Karen will be happy to answer pertinent questions.
